Honours for Trustee and former Rebuilding Childhoods Board Chair





We're delighted to let you know that two of our long-time supporters and volunteers, have been awarded MBEs by Her Majesty The Queen, for services to children.

The honours for Tarek Khlat, one of our Trustees and Diala Khlat, former Chair of our Rebuilding Childhoods Board, were announced today.

The <u>Honorary British awards</u> are conferred to foreign and Commonwealth nationals who have made an outstanding contribution to the United Kingdom.

A supporter since 2006, Tarek quickly took up the opportunity to become a member of the Rebuilding Childhoods (RC) Board, going on to Chair the Board in 2010. To date the RC Board has raised £22 million for children who have suffered abuse, helping them to rebuild their lives and move forward.

Tarek became an NSPCC Honorary Council member in 2013 and a year later he took on the role of Trustee, a position he remains in today. Amongst the long list of achievements he has been responsible for, Tarek, a co-Founder and CEO of a global financial services business, has supported the NSPCC in developing many key corporate relationships, organising major donor events and spearheading new fundraising initiatives.

Diala, an early-stage private equity investor, has also been supporting our work for 15 years. Beginning as an Event Committee member, moving on to work with our Rebuilding Childhoods Board and taking over as Chair, for 5 years, in 2015.

Diala has been instrumental in securing major partnerships, high-value sponsorships, hosting numerous engagement dinners, conceiving and organising hugely impactful fundraising galas and events and spearheading strategic collaborations, all contributing in a large scale to the £22 million raised to date by the successful volunteer RC Board. After standing down as Chair of our Rebuilding Childhoods Board last year, Diala has continued to support the NSPCC.
